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Progress Update



A quick glance at what we've been up to this month:

1. Sharing and gathering input from the Commit! community: On April 4, Commit! had the opportunity to present to the Dallas City Council. You can view [the presentation](#) here. We also attended [CitySquare's Annual Urban Ministries Prayer Breakfast](#) on April 12 and were honored to contribute to the panel that followed on the topic of poverty and education. The following day, we led a workshop on cradle to career strategies with the participants of [Leadership DISD](#). On April 20, we met with the faculty and staff of SMU's [Simmons School of Education and Human Development](#), followed by members of the Irving Community Action Network on April 23.

2. Partnering to grow Mayor Rawlings' Intern Fellowship Program: Commit! has joined as a financial sponsor and partner with the Dallas Mayor's office, [Education is Freedom](#), and several Dallas County school districts to help meaningfully grow the [Mayor's Intern Fellowship Program](#). To date, the program has trained over 750 rising juniors and seniors living in the city of Dallas interested in gaining a summer internship experience to help bolster their college applications and give them more insight into a potential career. An initial job fair was conducted on April 4 with additional training and job fairs being planned.

3. Learning from others doing collective impact work: On April 18, Commit! welcomed Jeff Edmondson from the [Strive Network](#) to Dallas. Drawing from his years of experience leading similar work, first in the greater Cincinnati and Northern Kentucky region and now nationally, Jeff helped our team and potential Commit! supporters get a better understanding of collaborative action and how to navigate our next steps. 4. Learning from others to define Kindergarten readiness: On April 17, the [E3 Alliance](#) of Central Texas

outlined the [Kindergarten Readiness results](#) from their fall 2011 assessment. Over 850 students in Central Texas were assessed using the Central Texas Guide to School Readiness (GSR). Overall, only 50% of all children were school-ready when they entered Kindergarten. Of low-income children who **did not** attend pre-K, only 19% were school-ready. The good news is that pre-K significantly improved outcomes for low-income children. Forty-two percent of low-income children attending some form of pre-K were school-ready. Celebrating Collaborative Action

WHO: [Texas College Access Network \(TxCAN\)](#)

WHAT: TxCAN (pronounced TexCAN) is part of the National College Access Network (NCAN), created to establish a sustainable network of agencies and organizations working collaboratively to increase student access and success in postsecondary education. The Dallas/North Texas area is one of two regional pilots in the state which brings together institutions of higher education, school districts, school counselors, non-profit and for-profit college access service providers, and state agencies.

ACADEMIC INDICATOR(S) THEY HOPE TO IMPROVE: SAT/ACT entrance exam scores; college enrollment, persistence, and completion.

RECENT ACTIVITIES: Students who complete a financial aid application (such as FAFSA or TASFA) are significantly more likely to continue onto a postsecondary education. Yet many students and parents are not familiar with the process and need the guidance of a financial aid advisor to help them through the process. On March 24, the North Texas TxCAN Network held a FAFSA/TASFA "Super Saturday" workshop to provide students and families one-on-one help in completing tax returns, submitting FAFSA or TASFA applications and guidance on scholarship applications. The results: 270 students representing 20 different Dallas-area school districts attended, 250 parents attended, 70 volunteers representing more than 20 organizations assisted, and an estimated \$21,000 in college and university scholarships was awarded that day to students who attended with hopefully substantially more attained as a result of successfully completed financial aid applications.
